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SACI COPYRIGHT INFRINGEMENT POLICY

It is the policy of Studio Arts College International to respect fully all rights regarding materials protected by copyright laws, including music, movies, and software. Unauthorized distribution of copyrighted material, including unauthorized peer-to-peer file sharing, may subject students and employees to civil or criminal liabilities.

The "Fair Use" exception allows for limited use of copyrighted material without permission from the copyright holder for purposes such as criticism, parody, news reporting, research and scholarship, and teaching. While many educational uses may be fair, SACI instructors are advised to evaluate whether they are making fair use of copyrighted materials each time they reproduce them to show in class, hand out, or post on SACINET. To avoid a potential legal challenge from the copyright holder, SACI encourages instructors to obtain permission when in doubt.

In the event that SACI receives a notification of claimed infringement from a copyright owner or other agents, it will investigate and take appropriate disciplinary action. SACI faculty members who are found not to be in compliance with federal copyright laws may be subject to dismissal. SACI students who are found not to be in compliance with federal copyright laws may be subject to expulsion.

Please note: Italian law governing Intellectual Property Rights requires that students and faculty not photocopy for personal use more than 15% of a book or periodical.

Penalties for Violation of Federal Copyright Laws

Violators of U.S. Federal copyright laws found liable for civil copyright infringement may be ordered to pay either actual damages or "statutory" damages affixed at not less than \$750 and not more than \$30,000 per work infringed. For "willful" infringement, a court may award up to \$150,000 per work infringed. A court can, in its discretion, also assess costs and attorneys' fees. For details, see Title 17, United States Code, Sections 504, 505. Willful copyright infringement can also result in criminal penalties, including imprisonment of up to five years and fines of up to \$250,000 per offense.
